It's very helpful to remember what led up to this, so here is a summary, based upon the Lion's Children's Bible accounts:

The Story of Stephen from the Book of Acts, Chapters 6 and 7

Jesus' followers, the apostles, were in Jerusalem telling everybody about Jesus, and lots of people chose to join them as his disciples. Everyone was made welcome and anyone in need was looked after. But it was difficult to be quite fair. Quarrels would break out, so much of their time was taken up with caring for everyone, and they didn't have enough time to preach and pray as Jesus had told them to do.

So they selected seven good men and put them in charge of sharing out the funds fairly, among the widows and those who were needy. One of the seven was an ordinary man called Stephen, and God used him to do extraordinary things. He was energetic and enthusiastic as well as being very good at arguing with the Jews about who Jesus was and explaining why he was the Messiah.

Unfortunately, he soon made enemies among those who hated Jesus. They made up lies about him and bribed others to tell lies about him as well and they brought him before the Jewish leaders. 'We heard him speaking against Moses and against God' they said.

As the charges were read out, Stephen faced his accusers bravely. His face was like an angel's - full of goodness and light. When it was Stephen's turn to speak he reminded them about the history of the Israelites. 'All down the ages, our nation has refused to listen to the leaders God has sent to them. In fact they were often picked on, bullied and even killed, even though they were sent by God. 'Now you, the Jewish leaders, have rejected and murdered God's most important messenger - his Son, Jesus.' At this, the Council members were furious. They shook their fists and shouted angrily at Stephen.

VE75

The Bank Holiday on Friday 8th May, and the weekend to follow had been intended to be a time of community celebrations. As the official VE75 webpage summarises:

"When VE Day dawns on 8th May 2020 it will be 75 years since the guns fell silent at the end of the war in Europe. Years of carnage and destruction had come to an end and millions of people took to the streets and pubs to celebrate peace, mourn their loved—ones and to hope for the future, but not forgetting those still in conflict until 15th August when it was announced that Japan had surrendered unconditionally to the Allies, effectively ending World War II."

Of course, the Coronavirus lockdown has prevented all of these community gatherings, though we are still encouraged to join with any or all of these:

10am: Bishop Nick & Diocesan Service of Reflection
11am: Two Minutes Silence & National Reflection

3pm: Nation's Toast to the Heroes of WW2

9pm: Queen's VE Day Speech

The Church of England has also published a short service outline that you may like to use at home – although we will include prayers for the day in our own online service on Sunday morning.

A Liturgy for the 75th Anniversary of VE DAY

Heaviness may endure for a night:

But joy comes in the morning.

God has been our refuge and our strength:

A present help in time of trouble.

We have come together on this day to commemorate the 75th anniversary of Victory in Europe, when the sounds of war fell silent on this continent. We come together conscious of our need for God's forgiveness for the sin and the desire to dominate others that leads to conflict between people, and war between nations. And as we remember the many soldiers, sailors, and airmen who gave their lives restraining evil and opposing tyranny, so we also come in thanksgiving for the years of peace that the nations of Europe have enjoyed since the Second World War. We gather joyfully today, as those who gathered on that first Victory day, glad of each other's company, and grateful for the laughter and love that follows times of sadness and loss. But above all things, let us pray that God's will may be done on earth as it is in heaven.

2 Corinthians 5.16–21

¹⁶ So from now on we regard no one from a worldly point of view. Though we once regarded Christ in this way, we do so no longer. ¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: the old has gone, the new is here! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: ¹⁹ that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. ²⁰ We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: be reconciled to God. ²¹ God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

God, our refuge and strength,
bring near the day when wars shall cease
and poverty and pain shall end,
that earth may know the peace of heaven
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

for the relief of want and suffering,

and for the praise of your name.

Guide us by your Spirit;

give us wisdom;

give us courage;

give us hope;

and keep us faithful now and always. Amen.
